ANNIVERSARIES:

REFLECTION

The Temple in Jerusalem was (and still is) a powerful symbol of holiness and a symbol of the connection and relationship between God and the Hebrew people. It is often assumed that Jesus' anger was directed at the traders and moneychangers because their business had infringed on and desecrated the temple precinct. But the reality is a bit more complicated. The Temple was the holiest site for sacrifice to God. The tradition dictated that sacrifice made by a priest on the altar was the highest form of worship. The best animal to sacrifice was a healthy, properly formed creature. Rather than walking a lamb all the way from somewhere like Galilee to Jerusalem, the faithful would purchase their sacrifice animal at the Temple itself – thus the presence of the people selling cattle, sheep and doves. However, to further complicate matters, the Temple traders would not accept Roman coins to purchase the sacrificial animals as they bore the image of the deified emperor. Therefore, money changers were required to exchange Roman currency for acceptable coinage - so the money changers were also playing their part in the prayer life of the Temple.

Jesus' outrage is not so much with the traders and the moneychangers as with the whole religious practice and hierarchical structure that has developed to a point where the only way a person can pray in a 'valid' way is to purchase an animal and hand it over to a priest who goes behind a screened wall to sacrifice the animal. The only way to seek God's forgiveness and mercy was to 'buy' it at the Temple. This was what outraged Jesus. He could not stomach the injustice nor the barriers that had been erected between the people and their God.

SUNDAY SESSION MARCH 10, 7.00 TO 8.30 PM IN THE PARISH HALL

'Roman Crucifixion and the Death of Jesus' with Dr Debra Snoddy

Our evening together will investigate the death of Jesus from a variety of perspectives. While the Gospels give us an account of why Jesus dies, they obscure the horror that is crucifixion. It was so excruciatingly painful that even the Roman's make little mention of it in their texts and traditions. Why were people drawn to public killings to watch people die from this unique form of capital punishment? And how could Roman executioners kill their prisoners with such cruel efficiency?

Debra will detail the circumstances that would lead a criminal under Roman Law to be crucified. How it was done and where, as well as the various forms of crucifixion that were used during the Age of Roman Empire, will help inform participants of the unique sacrifice that Jesus has made for us. As the perfect lamb of sacrifice, Jesus accomplished all that God had asked him to do. By understanding Jesus' death on the cross, we may come to fully appreciate what God has done for us in Christ.

Join us for an evening like no other, where you will be provoked and challenged. In order to fully appreciate the miracle of the Easter Resurrection, the mystery of crucifixion must be explored.
